

Edibles

A few Short season/cool weather options

Beets- eat greens & roots, harvest in 60-90 days Carrots Store in the ground – after soil lightly freezes, mulch and harvest during winter thaw Planting small seeds <u>https://www.melindamyers.com/audiovideo/melindas-garden-moment-videos/planting-starting-newplants/4-ways-to-make-sowing-small-seeds-</u>

Sugar snap peas – 60 to 70 days Patio Pride – AAS winner, compact variety matures in <u>https://all-americaselections.org/product/pea-patio-pride/</u> Cabbage – 60 to 100 days Katrina – AAS Winner, 45 days from transplant, 55 days from seed <u>https://all-americaselections.org/product/cabbage-katarina/</u> Broccoli- 60 to 70 days Cauliflower – 50 to 60 days Carlia – plant in fall (6 weeks before the ground fragges)

Garlic - plant in fall (6 weeks before the ground freezes) or very early spring for summer harvest Plant cloves – 2 to3" deep and 6" apart

Cool Weather Annuals & Fall Containers Gardens

Bulbs

Wait until night temperatures are consistently in 40's and low 50's Plant Bulbs 2 to 3 times their height deep Space according to label – closer for short lived bulbs Increase impact Minor (small bulbs) groups of 15 to 20 Larger bulbs groups of 5 to 9

Naturalizing - toss and plant for a "natural look" Plant early, mid and late bloomers

Reduce maintenance and increase beauty

Double up plantings – double bloom or extend flowering

Daffodils with squills or grape hyacinths – equally assertive Hyacinths with glory of the snow All together – tulips, daffodils, hyacinths & fritillaria Virginia bluebells, daffodils

Plant bulbs w/ hardy pansies like Cool Wave – fall and spring bloom Plant bulbs with perennials double or extend bloom

perennials mask declining bulb foliage

Lawn art – Siberian squills (hard to remove if you change your mind) Extend Bloom Time

Very early blooming

Winter aconite

Snowdrops

Summer

Lilies

Allium (some are fibrous rooted not bulbs)

Fall

Wildlife

Resistant Bulbs

Daffodils, hyacinths, grape hyacinths, squills, fritillaria, *Crocus tommasinianus*

Protection

Bulbs cages, structures....

Repellents

Plantskydd - organic

Mulching to prevent early sprouting and frost heaving Wait until ground is frozen to apply mulch

Forcing Bulbs

12 - 15 weeks of 35 to 45 degrees to initiate bloom <u>https://www.melindamyers.com/audio-video/melindas-garden-moment-videos/container-raised-bed-gardening/forcing-bulbs-in-a-pot</u>

Sprinkle grass seed over soil after planting for added greenery Chill bulbs then place in glass vase with pebbles Plant extra for arrangements

Mums, Asters and Perennials

Warm Soil and Cool Air great for plant establishment **Mums and Asters**

Find new ways to include them in the landscape

Use as permanent addition to perennial beds and shrub borders Increase survival by leaving them stand for winter and winter mulching Buy in spring, plant, pinch back to 6" through June U of MN hardy mum introductions – Mammoth Mums https://mnhardy.umn.edu/varieties/flowers/chrysanthemums

Other Perennials

Amend soil w/ compost, manure or other organic matter before planting Dig, Divide and replant early flowering perennials <u>https://www.melindamyers.com/audio-video/melindas-garden-moment-videos/lawn-landscape-design/dividing-perennials?ccm_paging_p=19</u>

Native Plants

Six weeks before the ground freezes Ephemerals planted in fall – just roots so often sold as bare root plants Healthy Spring bloomers may look weather worn but ok to plant in fall Seeds – Dormant planting – seed in ground for winter, sprouts in spring

Trees

Take care when moving from nursery to home https://www.melindamyers.com/audio-video/melindas-garden-momentvideos/trees-shrubs-roses/transporting-trees-from-the-nursery-to-yourhome?ccm paging p=6Check for overhead and underground utilities Find root flare Planting hole Depth from root flare to bottom of root ball Width 2 to 5 times wider than root ball Set in hole – moving by root ball not trunk – ask for help Remove wire cage and peel back burlap Some nurseries won't guarantee if you do this Loosen any girdling roots Backfill with existing soil https://www.melindamyers.com/audio-video/melindas-garden-momentvideos/planting-starting-new-plants/tree-planting-tips?ccm_paging_p=33

Shrubs

Crown (where roots meet stems) at or slightly above soil surface Hole same depth as distance from crown to bottom of root ball Hole width 2-3 times as wide as root ball Properly Space Roll pot to loosen roots if needed and slide plant out of pot OR remove bottom of pot then slice side of pot and peel off Set in hole then slice pot if roots don't fill pot Loosen any girdling roots <u>https://www.melindamyers.com/audio-video/melindas-garden-moment-audio-tips/planting-starting-new-plants/planting-shrubs?ccm_paging_p=16</u>

Trees and Shrubs

Mulch – pull away from trunk and stems

Water – thoroughly

Check once or twice a week depending on soil type, rainfall, and temperatures <u>https://www.melindamyers.com/audio-video/melindas-garden-moment-audio-tips/trees-shrubs-roses/watering-tips-for-new-trees?ccm_paging_p=25</u>

Properly space trees and shrubs for longevity Fill in voids with annuals and perennials Each year you need fewer annuals, dig and move perennials as trees and shrubs approach maturity Minimal pruning of newly planted trees and shrubs Remove crossing branches, rubbing branches, co-dominant stems Save major pruning – for once plants are established Remove tags that may girdle plants as they grow
