# COMBINATIONS SHOWN SUCCULENT COMBINATIONS

Bright to high light, well-drained potting mix, most have a smaller root system compared to the above ground growth and are relatively slow growing. This means it is easier to create long term container combinations.

- Kalanchoe luciae 'Fantastic' & Mexican Sedum or other trailer
- Pencil Cactus (Euphorbia tirucalli) & Echeveria
- Assorted Succulents
- Haworthia
- Echeverias
- · Aloe

## TROPICAL COMBINATIONS

Most tropical and sub-tropical plants prefer moderate light and moist, well-drained soil

- Anthurium clarinervium (epiphyte) & Tradescantia spathacea 'Tricolor' (Rhoeo discolor 'Tricolor')
- Anthurium & Croton (Codiaeum)
   Anthurium tolerate moderate to bright light,
   Croton prefer bright light for the best color
- <u>Dracaena</u> 'Lemon Surprise' & Croton
   Dracaena, Spider Plant, Cordyline, Prayer Plant
   and Palms often develop <u>brown tips</u> due to
   fluoride and chlorine in the water.
- <u>Begonia</u> 'Benigo Pink' & <u>Wire Vine</u>
   (Muehlenbeckia)

   Bright light and moderately moist soil, spring through fall and a bit drier in winter
- Gryphon Begonia & Tradescantia zebrina
   Gryphon is more tolerant of drier soil than Rex
   Begonias. Trailing Tradescantias benefit from
   regular pruning.

# SELECT PLANTS THAT REQUIRE THE SAME GROWING CONDITIONS

- Assorted Succulents: Haworthia, Echeverias, Aloe
- <u>Papyrus</u>, Dracaena, Fern, Peperomia, Ti Plant
   Plants prefer moist, well-drained soil, moderate
   to bright indirect light

## MANAGING SEASONAL BLOOM

- Red Bromeliad (Guzmania) & English Ivy
- Assorted Succulents & Flowering Kalanchoe
  Use flowering plants with attractive foliage that
  can remain in the container garden. Or make
  changing out seasonal flowering plants easy and
  minimize root disturbance. Bury empty pot in
  planter, leave flowering pot in its own container,
  set it in the sunken pot and change out as
  needed.

# LOTS OF PLANTS IN A SMALL CONTAINER

Prayer Plant, Kalanchoe, Elephant Ears,
 Variegated Ficus
 Enjoy and repot into individual containers or create a new combination with fewer specimens in an appropriate size container.

- Cordyline (thriller), <u>Coleus</u> & <u>Begonia</u> (filler) & <u>Oxalis</u> (spiller)
- Dracaena 'Lemon Lime' & Pothos
- Snake Plant & Heartleaf Philodendron
- <u>Rubber Tree</u> (Ficus elastica 'Tineke'), <u>Spider</u>
   <u>Plant</u> (Chlorophytum comosum) & <u>Asparagus</u>
   <u>Fern</u> (Asparagus densiflorus)
- Ficus elastica Chroma Belize
- Thriller, Filler & Spiller planted in individual pots
- Rubber Tree, Spider Plant, Caladium
   Create a garden of individual plants, which allows you to provide individual care while enjoying attractive combinations.

## A FEW POSSIBLE COMBINATIONS

New Zealand Flax (Phormium tenax), Aloe & Kalanchoe and more
 Bright to high light, water thoroughly when top few inches of soil are dry

# THRILLERS WITH POSSIBLE COMPANION PLANTS

- <u>Banana</u> (Musa) shown with Marguerite Sweet Potato Vine and Sweet Alyssum
- Combine with <u>Neon Pothos</u> and <u>Copper Leaf</u> (Acalypha 'Bronze Bath')

Moderate to bright, indirect light, moist, well-drained soil. Water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry. Copper Leaf can drop leaves in droughty conditions.

- Colocasia shown with Caladium
- Combine with Red and Green <u>Arrowhead Vine</u> (Syngonium podophyllum)

Low to bright light, benefits from high humidity, water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry

- Palms
- Combine with <u>Heartleaf Philodendron</u>
   (Philodendron hederaceum) & Red Edge
   <u>Chinese Evergreen</u> (Aglaonema)
   Low, moderate to bright indirect light, water
   thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry
- <u>Fiddle Leaf Fig</u> (Ficus lyrata) in large planter with Dracaena, Rubber Plant & Ivy
- Combine with Tradescantia spathacea 'Tricolor' (Rhoeo discolor 'Tricolor') & English Ivy
   Bright light, moist, well-drained soil
- Weeping Fig (Ficus benjamina) shown with Peace Lily, Dracaenas and Pothos
- Variegated Weeping Fig (Ficus benjamina 'Variegata')
- Combine with <u>Spider Plant</u> & <u>Foxtail Fern</u> (Asparagus densiflorus 'Meyersii')

<u>Leaf drop</u> on Weeping Fig occurs with changes in location and the growing conditions. Foxtail Fern drops leaves when growing in too much or too little light

- <u>Dragon Tree</u> (*Dracaena marginata*)
- Combine with <u>Bromeliad</u> and/or <u>Tradescantia</u>
   'Pistachio White'

Bright light, water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry. Regularly prune Tradescantia for more compact growth.

- Dracaena warneckii 'White Jewel'
- Red Anthurium & Angel/Wire Vine (Muehlenbeckia)

Bright light, water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry.

- False Aralia (Plerandra elegantissima)
- Combine with <u>Begonia</u> & <u>Purple Inch Plant</u> (Tradescantia)

False Aralia does best with high humidity and moist soil. Tradescantia is pretty adaptable and benefits from regular trimming.

- <u>Japanese Laurel</u> (Acuba japonica)
- Combine with <u>Fatsia japonica</u> & <u>Asparagus</u>
   <u>Fern</u> (Asparagus densiflorus)

Moderate light, water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry

- Dieffenbachia
- Combine with <u>Chloe Begonia</u> & <u>Artillery Plant</u> (Pilea microphylla)

Bright, indirect light, providing even light reduces leaf loss on Dieffenbachia, water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry

- <u>Crotons</u> (Codiaeum), Codiaeum variegatum
   'Franklin Roosevelt' shown
  - Combine with <u>Lipstick Plant</u> (Aeschynanthus) & <u>Chinese Evergreen</u> (Aglaonema)

Bright light, water when top inch of soil is dry, Crotons are less colorful in low light situations

of Invasive Plants

- <u>Variegated Shell Ginger</u> (Alpinia zerumbet 'Variegata')
- Combine with <u>Purple Passion Vine</u> (Gynura aurantiaca)

Bright, indirect light, water as soil begins to dry

- Cordyline 'Lemon Lime'
- Combine with <u>Creeping Fig</u> (Ficus pumila) & <u>ColorBlaze Wicked Witch Coleus</u>
   Moderate to bright light, water when the top inch of soil is dry
- Raven ZZ Plant (Zamioculcas zamiifolia 'Raven')
- Combine with <u>Cuban Oregano</u> (Plectranthus
   (Cerveza Lime') & <u>Kalanchoe</u>
   Moderate to bright indirect light and will-drained soil
- <u>Snake Plant</u> (Dracaena trifasciata) formerly Sansevieria
- Combine with <u>Hoya</u> & <u>Euphorbia</u> 'Pink Cadillac'

Bright to high light and well-drained soil - although Snake Plant tolerates low light

- Bird of Paradise (Strelitzia reginae)
- Combine with <u>Sago Palm</u> (Cycas revoluta) & <u>Turtle Vine</u> (Callisia repens)
   Bird of Paradise flower best when pot bound

and most often fail to bloom due to insufficient light. Provide high light and well-drained soil, regularly trim Turtle Vine for more compact growth

- Peace Lily (Spathiphyllum)
- Combine with <u>Ribbon Plant</u> (Homalocladium)
   Bright, indirect light, moist, well-drained soil
- Or <u>Boston Fern</u> & <u>Rex Begonia Vine</u> (Cissus discolor)

- Zebra Plant (Aphelandra squarrosa)
- Combine with Pilea glauca 'Silver Sparkles' &
   Austral Gem Fern (Asplenium x 'Austral Gem')
   Moist, well-drained soil with bright, indirect light,
   pinch Pilea for more compact growth, Austral
   Gem Fern is less fussy and does not shed like
   Boston Fern

# A FEW MORE TO CONSIDER

- Nerve Plant (Fittonia)

  High humidity, moist, well-drained soil and indirect light, short-lived plant, so regularly root cuttings and start new plants
- Ripple Peperomia (Peperomia caperata)
  Bright, indirect light, water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry. Insufficient light will slow, even stop, growth.
- Moon Valley Pilea (Pilea mollis 'Moon Valley')
   Similar care as African Violet, high humidity, moist, well-drained soil, bright, indirect light
- Rattlesnake Plant (Calathea leuconeura)
   Low to moderate indirect light, moist, well-drained soil, high humidity, brown leaf tips from drought or fluoride and/or chlorine
- Prayer Plant (Maranta leuconeura)
   Low to moderate indirect light, moist, well-drained soil, high humidity, brown leaf tips from drought or fluoride and/or chlorine in the water
- Pink Quill (Tillandsia cyanea)
   Bromeliads, including Tillandsias are epiphytes that grow in the tree canopies in nature. Pink Quill is usually grown in a well-drained potting mix and watered thoroughly when top inch or so of potting mix is dry. They prefer bright, indirect light and are long blooming and easy care. Once parent plant dies new sprouts emerge and can be moved to their own container.



# Streptocarpella

Requires care similar to African Violet. Warm, draft-free location, bright light and moist organic potting mix, water when top inch of soil is beginning to dry, avoid cold water on the leaves as that can cause damage

- <u>Crocodile Fern</u> (Microsorum musifolium 'Crocodyllus')
   Bright, indirect light, high humidity, moist, well-drained soil and temperatures over 50°F (10°C)
- Moon Valley Pilea (Pilea mollis 'Moon Valley')
   Similar care as African Violet, high humidity, moist, well-drained soil, bright, indirect light
- <u>Celebes Pepper</u> (Piper crocatum)
   Slow growing, East or West facing window, water when top inch of soil is dry, leaf drop occurs when temperatures are below 59°F (15°C)
- Geo Plant (Geogenanthus ciliates)
   Similar care as Peace Lily, bright, indirect light and moist soil

- Wardian case
- Open terrariums
- Monitor soil moisture
- Better for plants that do not tolerate high humidity and moisture of closed terrariums, like cacti and succulents
- Copper and Glass Terrariums
