- Apply color, texture and other decorating principles

- Container gardens for screening, color, fragrance and more
- Add water features, fire pits and tables, garden art...as desired

Include furnishings and features that appeal to all ages

FUNCTION: HOW WILL YOU USE THE SPACE?

- Solitary space for relaxing, reading and more
- Space for small gatherings
 - Recommended space needed
 - 6-10' x 8-12' (1.8 3 meters x 2.4 3.7 meters)
 - Entertainment

CREATING A SPACE TO ENTERTAIN

- Tie indoors to the outdoors
 - Make it convenient
- Easy to maintain
- Furnishings suited to the space
- Provide sufficient space to sit, move and more
 - <u>3' (1 meter) on all sides around the table and chairs for people to move</u>

CREATIVE DIY FURNISHINGS

- Old table turned planter and water feature
- Cement top with hosta leaf impressions
- Succulents growing on side of bar

BRING THE TABLE TO THE GARDEN

• Edible Flowers

<u>Container of your seasonal favorites</u>

- Swiss chard, lettuce, pansies
- Salad Bar planter with greens
 - Have guests pick and create their own salad
- <u>Elevated Planter with Cloche</u>
- Movable planters for convenience
 - Demeter Elevated Garden
- Plant-a-Bar
 - Include herbs to flavor beverages

EVENING GATHERINGS AROUND THE FIRE

- Leave at least 2 2.5' (.6 .8 meter) between edge of fire pit and surrounding seating
- 2.5' (.8 meter) of circulation behind the chairs

MANAGING MOSQUITOES

- Keep them away
 - Fan mosquitoes are weak fliers
 - Citronella candles every few feet (.5 meter) throughout the space
 - Mosquito Dunk Trap Doug Tallamy's recommendation for DIY mosquito trap
 - Partially fill a 5 gallon bucket with water
 - Add a handful of straw or hay
 - Place it in a sunny place in your yard (I recommend away from gathering spots)
 - After a few days the hay creates a "brew" that attracts female mosquitoes where they lay their eggs
 - Add a <u>Summit Mosquito Dunk</u> to the mix to kill the larvae once the eggs hatch. The dunk provides 30 days of control and won't harm beneficial insects, people, pets and wildlife.

DEFINE THE SPACE

- Low walls
- Plantings
 - Grasses
- Structures with canopies and walls
- Planters at various levels

- Green Walls
- Picture Frame Green Wall Garden
- Makeover by fence
 - Use existing shrubs to define the space
 - Mulched to smother weeds and create surface
 - Containers to soften fence and further define space
- Makeover by end of driveway
 - Temporary bamboo screen to soften neighbor's garage
 - Upright grasses and shrubs in front of screen
 - Indoor-outdoor carpet to define space, cover cracks
 - Containers allow for seasonal gardening and changes

CREATING PRIVACY - WALLS, SCREENS, DIVIDERS

- Garden between house and driveway
 - Morning Glory (reseeds readily some species invasive in some areas) and native Honeysuckle vines on obelisks
 - Low fencing and plantings along border
- Avoid monoculture such as all arborvitae
- A few examples:
 - Pots of tropical plants dense screening
 - Dutchman's Pipe Vine
 - Hanging baskets and planters at Dallas Arboretum
 - <u>Silver Falls Dichondra</u> with white pumpkins
 - Black-eyed Susan Vine (Thunbergia)
 - Canna, Sweet Potato...
 - Pile of pumpkins and decorative squash
 - Use tall plants next to much shorter plants to create illusion of depth
 - Lattice fencing at corner of deck
 - Arbor with hanging baskets and containers for screening

- Mix annual and perennial vines for quick cover
- Mix two different vines to double impact or extend bloom time
- Espalier screening
- Wall of containers at Bookworm Gardens (BGS) in Sheboygan, WI
- Belgian fence at Minnesota Landscape Arboretum
- <u>Weeping European Larch</u> (*Larix decidua* 'Pendula') trained over low fence
- Asparagus divider
- Hanging basket of kale, parsley and pansies above raised bed gardens at Chicago Botanic Garden Fruit and Vegetable Island (CBG)
- Tomato plants trained on screening (CBG)
- Gutters and assorted planters
 - <u>Container Garden Care</u>
- Topsy Turvy Planters
- Screening from small deck in Virginia
 - Boxwood left in nursery pot
 - Blight resistant varieties, like New Gen
 - Elevated on overturned, empty nursery pots
 - Black Lace Elderberry for additional color
 - Burlap masks the pots
 - Colorful self-watering pots with <u>Shenandoah</u> <u>Switchgrass</u> in front
- Structure and Art
 - Vertical vs. horizontal boards
 - Wattle Fences
 - Make your own from landscape trimmings
 - Wriggle Fencing and Arborvitae
 - One way to <u>Create Wriggle Fence</u> from harvest to finished fence
 - Reclaimed materials
 - Metal screens
 - Veradek 3-Panel Privacy Screen

- Old tools
- Old sporting equipment (BGS)
- Dress up fencing and screens
 - Plantings and hanging baskets
 - Old window frames with artwork
 - Painted walls (CA)
 - Bed spring with morning glory

 - Painted wreath frames
 - Vertical Gardens
 - Planter at Enabling Garden (CBG)
 - * 1 x 4 frame
 - * Plywood back
 - * Hardware cloth and/or weed barrier
 - * Well-drained potting mix

CONTAINERS THROUGHOUT THE SEASON

ADD SOME SHADE

- Cloth and canvas coverings
- Deciduous vines
 - Let warming sunlight in during cooler months
 - Provide shade during warmer months
- Edible vines
 - Consider impact of:
 - Falling fruits
 - Visiting wildlife dining on fruit

- Structures to purchase or create
 - Seat cushion storage on structure
 - Convenient and adds color
- Willow saplings in grow bags trained to cover

FIRE FEATURES

- Allow at least 2-2.5' (.6-.8 meter) between the edge of the fire pit and the surrounding seats
- Leave an additional 2.5' (.8 meter) behind chairs for circulation
- Lucky Red Lantana for faux fire feature

WATER FEATURES

- Lighting to extend your enjoyment into the evening
 - Dragonfly Solar Lantern
 - Dahlia Blossom Punched Metal Lantern
 - Candelabra in garden
 - Chandelier
 - Light arbors
 - Votive candles in punch cups
