USE COLOR AND TEXTURE TO HELP YOU CREATE AN ATTRACTIVE CONTAINER GARDEN

- Warm Colors
 - Energizing
 - Warmth
 - Make large area feel smaller
 - Provide focal point
- Cool Colors
 - Small areas appear larger
 - Calming
 - · Cool

- Monotone
 - One dominant color, e.g. white moon garden
- Blending Colors
 - Colors that appear next to each other on the artist's color wheel
- Color Echoing
 - Repetition of color from one plant (flowers, leaves or stem) to others in the container
- Contrasting / Complementary Colors
- Colors opposite each other on the artist's color wheel
 - Red and green
- Blue and yellow
- Eye-catching combinations
- Rainbow Colors
 - May be overwhelming or exactly what you want for the space
- Pantone Color of the Year
 - Viva Magenta

TEXTURE

- Bold
 - Large leaves
 - Large and round flowers grab your attention
- Fine
 - Narrow leaves
 - Spike-like or small flowers
- Contrasting textures can be very effective

MAINTENANCE TIPS & TRICKS CONTAINERS

- Drainage holes or self-watering pots
- Tolerant of weather extremes if used year-round outdoors
- Double potting nursery pot inside decorative pot
 - For containers that lack drainage holes



- For ease of overwintering perennials, trees and shrubs in colder climates
- Coco fiber liners
 - Aqua savers plastic infused into the liner
 - Plastic pot inside coco fiber lined pot
- Budget Wise

WELL-DRAINED POTTING MIX

- Pros and cons of changing potting mix from year to year
 - Reduce risk of disease and insect problems
 - I use an organic mix and repurpose it into my garden beds or compost pile
 - Expensive to change out potting mix yearly
 - Minimally freshen it up with some new potting mix
- To fill the pot or not
 - More potting mix the more water and nutrients it holds
 - False bottoms reduce weight and soil needed in large containers
 - Purchase Ups-A-Daisy or other such item
 - Make your own
 - Plastic bottles
 - Cans
 - Cell packs...
 - Cover these with landscape fabric to prevent potting mix from settling into the bottom of the pot

WATERING TIPS

- Check daily temperature, soil mix, number of plants and type of plants influence watering
- Water thoroughly so excess runs out the bottom of the pot
- Extend time between watering
 - Plant Nannies
 - Watering globes

- Wool Pellets sustainable organic product
- Make it easy with irrigation

FERTILIZATION

- Ebert's recommends constant feed (once or twice weekly) with liquid fertilizer
 - Lots of plants in the container
- Lower maintenance
 - Low nitrogen, slow-release product like
 Milorganite
 - At planting and mid summer if needed

ELEVATE POT OFF PATIO, DECK OR BALCONY

- Pot feet and Surface Savers
 - Better drainage and airflow
 - Reduces risk of mold and discoloring patio or deck surface

MOVING CONTAINERS

- Pot Lifter
- Garden pot mover
- Planter caddy

OVERWINTERING PERENNIALS, TREES AND SHRUBS IN CONTAINERS

- Grow plants in weather-proof pot
- Plants one zone hardier are better able to survive cold winters in a pot in the landscape
- Added protection
 - Insulate with bales of straw, annual planters, wood chips...
 - Move into unheated garage
 - Water whenever the soil is thawed and dry
 - Watch for voles treat with vole repellent like <u>Plantskydd</u>

OVERWINTERING NON-HARDY PLANTS (LIKE CITRUS AND CANNAS...) IN COLD CLIMATES

- Move inside and grow like a houseplant
 - Bananas
 - Hibiscus
 - Citrus
- Store "bulbs" in a cool, dark location

PLANT SELECTION

- Grow plants together that require the same growing conditions
- Or plant the exception in a pot with preferred potting mix and set in container with others

DON'T HARM THE TREES

- Sink nursery pot in ground set smaller planted pot inside that
- Set containers on soil surface among groundcovers

EDIBLE PLANTS

- Combine veggies, herbs and fruit with ornamental plants for variety
- Greater productivity when edible plants are grown in their own containers
- Tomatoes in Container
 - Tomatoes: Tips & Tricks webinar
 - Password: vM\$48Cx!
 - Handout
- Indeterminate
 - Grow and flower until pruned late season or killed by frost
 - Need support
 - Large 5 gallon or larger pot
 - Improves yield in container 14-20" wide
- Determinate
 - Grow a certain height and stop
 - Some need support others do not
 - 2-3 gallon pot
 - Patio Choice Yellow tomato (AAS winner)
- Semi-determinate or trailing in hanging basket
 - Lizzano, Torenzo (AAS winners) and others
- Challenges with small upside down tomato planters
 - Weight
 - Watering needs
 - DIY solution 5 gallon pot turned upside down planter

FRUIT

- Strawberries
- Day-neutral and everbearing frequent harvests
- June bearing (one crop) and day-neutral produce runners
- Delizz (AAS winner)
- Start from seeds indoors in spring
- Fruit the first year
- Strawberry pot or bag
- Use PVC tube with holes in center of container to deliver water to all parts of the planter
- Overwintering strawberries
 - Sink plastic pot in the ground in vacant part of the garden
- In unheated garage may damage clay or terracotta pots as soil freezes and expands
- Bushel and Berry compact fruit
- Blueberries
- Only need one plant to produce fruit
- 2 varieties grown close together yields more than double
- Perpetua produces several harvests
- Raspberry Shortcake
 - Thornless
- Produce flowers and fruit on first year canes
- Baby Cakes Blackberry
- Thornless
- Remove 2nd year canes after fruiting
- Narrow, upright apples or dwarf varieties
- Urban, Red & Golden Sentinel
- Need 2 varieties or nearby crabapple for pollination
- A few self-fertile varieties, like Jon-a-Red

WATER PLANTS IN CONTAINERS

- Create water garden in container without drainage holes
- Plants in containers with drainage holes or slits in side
- Aquatic potting mix
- Top with pea gravel if desired

BOG

"Bog is a nutrient-poor peatland characterized by acidic, saturated peat and the prevalence of sphagnum mosses and ericaceous shrubs" Michigan State University

- Grow a few native bog plants in a container without drainage holes
- Potting mix
 - 50% sphagnum peat moss
 - 30% horticultural sand
 - 20% long fiber sphagnum moss

OR

- 1 part horticultural sand
- 2 parts peat moss
- Couple handfuls of sphagnum moss

Do not release plants into waterways at end of season

TROUGHS

Make your own

HANGING BASKETS

- Additional growing space
- Screening
- Dress up walls or fences
- Add color in the shade
 - Hang with straps from tree branches
- Black-eyed Susan vine (Thunbergia) climbing up and trailing down basket
- Use pulley system, irrigation or extendable watering wand for ease of watering

WINDOW BOXES

- Dress up home and structures
- Complement the architecture of house and your landscape
- Provide privacy
- Place to easily open windows as needed
- Alternative displays
 - Set on shelf
 - Plants and birdhouses on top not in window box

SEASONAL DISPLAYS

- Spring flowering bulbs
 - Buy pre-cooled
 - Set potted bulbs in container
 - Forcing bulbs
 - Post flowering care
- Twigs from spring flowering plants
- Plan ahead for holidays, gatherings and special occasions
- Summer lots of options
- Fall
 - Foliage and flower color
 - Mums
 - Asters
 - Rudbeckia
 - Grasses
 - Lettuce
 - Kale
 - Mustards
 - Ornamental Peppers (frost sensitive)
 - Create dried arrangements from landscape trimmings
- Winter
 - Greens
 - Berry covered and colorful branches
 - Decorations

UPCYCLED CONTAINERS

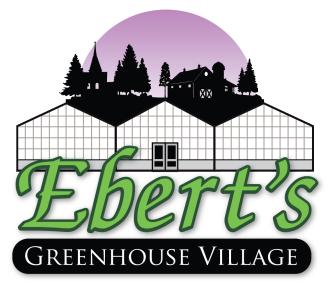
Anything that can hold potting mix and drainage holes can be added
