A FEW HOUSEPLANTS TO CONSIDER

I took a very conservative approach and included those that were listed as nontoxic to both people and pets to avoid any confusion. Use the resources provided as you continue to expand your indoor plant collection. This will provide a starting point. As you know, individual allergic responses to anything can vary, so keep this in mind as you create or expand your indoor garden.

MATCH PLANTS TO THE GROWING CONDITIONS

Light is often the greatest limiting factor for successfully growing indoor plants. Use the following information as you select and place houseplants in your home.

LOW TO MODERATE LIGHT

- Able to read without too much strain
- Back from or to the side of an east- or west-facing window
- In front of a north window

BRIGHT, INDIRECT LIGHT

- Plants in NE or NW window
 - Some direct light in the morning or afternoon
 - Bright the rest of the day

BRIGHT LIGHT

- Plants near an east- or west-facing window
 - o 2 to 4 hours of direct sun
 - No direct midday sun
 - Back from south-facing window (except for winter in north)

DIRECT SUNLIGHT

- 4 to 5 hours of direct sunlight
- Northern gardeners move plants to south-facing window in winter

BOOSTING THE LIGHT

- Swapping plants between high and low light locations
 - Switch plants every 2 weeks from low to high light locations
- Artificial lights

LOW LIGHT TOLERANT

CAST IRON PLANT, SALOON PLANT

Aspidistra eliator

- Tolerates very low light and humidity
- Allow soil to dry between watering
- o Especially in winter
- Variegated varieties available
- Speckled Cast Iron Plant
- Aspidistra eliator 'Milky Way'

STAGHORN FERN

Platycerium spp.

- Low to medium light
- Epiphyte usually found mounted on a piece of wood
- Water once the compost or peat moss starts to dry
- High humidity
- No cold drafts
- Forms offsets or pups that can be removed to start new plants

PRAYER PLANT

Maranta and Calathea

- Moderate, indirect light
- Scorched and brown spots in direct light
- Pale leaves, less colorful when it doesn't receive sufficient light
- Consistently moist soil
- Sensitive to fluoride and chlorine in the water
- Needs high humidity
- Brown leaf tips and margins
- Growing Prayer Plants Indoors

BROMELIADS

Various Genera

- Those with soft, pliable leaves are more tolerant of low light
- Place those with thicker leaves in brighter light
- Epiphyte grown in a well-drained potting mix or grown as an air plant
- Long blooming, providing months of colorful flowers
- Water often enough to prevent roots from drying
 - Tank types
 - Keep leaf cup full of water and refresh regularly
 - Those growing in soil
 - Water thoroughly and often enough to prevent roots from drying
 - o Tillandsia (Air Plants)
 - Soak in tepid water every week or two

Pruning Tips for Shrubs

BRIGHT, INDIRECT LIGHT

SPIDER PLANT

Chlorophytum comosum

- Bright, indirect light
- Slightly moist soil, but well-drained
- o Green variety more tolerant of low light
- Less variegation in lower light
- Avoid cold drafts
- Brown tips from fluoride and chlorine in water
- Propagate by division or offsets

NERVE PLANT

Fittonia

- Bright, indirect light
- Moist, well-drained, not soggy soil
- High humidity
- Can be short lived, so regularly take cuttings to start new plants
- Green leaves with red or white veins

PEPEROMIA

Peperomia

- Prefer bright, indirect light, but will tolerate lower light
- Less variegation and smaller leaves in low light
- Water when top inch of soil is dry
- Allow top few inches of soil to dry for thicker leafed varieties
- Generally slow growing, so minimal fertilizer and pruning needed
- Ripple Peperomia
- Peperomia caperata 'Ripple'
- Textured leaves
- Watermelon Peperomia
- Peperomia argyreia
- Smooth leaves colored like watermelon rind

Peperomias listed as non-toxic to people, cats and dogs on ASPCA and most Children's hospital sites. North Carolina State University mentions

Peperomia obtusifola leaves contain alkaloids that are moderately toxic to people but there have been no reported cases and some toxicity to animals.

BOSTON FERN

Nephrolepis exaltata

- Bright, indirect light
- Moist soil
- High humidity

GRAPE IVY

Cissus alata formerly Cissus rhombifolia

- Bright, indirect light
- Water thoroughly when top few inches of soil are dry
- Avoid drafts
- Pinch to encourage bushier growth

CHOCOLATE SOLDIER

Alsobia dianthiflora formerly Episcia

- Bright, indirect to direct light
- Succulent water when soil starts to dry and more often when flowering
- Protect from drafts
- Pinch to encourage more compact growth

PURPLE PASSION

Gynura aurantiaca

- Bright, indirect light
- Well-drained potting mix
- Water when soil just begins to dry
- Do not overwater, soggy soil leads to rot
- Prune to encourage more compact growth



PARLOR PALM, BAMBOO PALM

Chamaedorea elegans

- Prefers bright, indirect light, but will tolerate lower light
- Prefers humidity, but tolerates normal home conditions
- Brown leaf tips on palms can be caused by low humidity and fluoride in water
- Relatively slower growing
- <u>Trim</u> or <u>air layering</u> tall plants
- Sensitive to fluoride and chlorine in water
- Human toxicity for Bamboo Palm C. seifrizii
- o Fruit has oxalic acid, irritating to skin when handled

ARECA PALM

Dypsis lutescens

• Same as above, but less tolerant of lower light conditions

CHRISTMAS, EASTER & THANKSGIVING CACTUS

Schlumbergera spp.

- Differences between the three:
- Christmas cactus
 - Most sold in stores are hybrids and have small, smooth segments
- o Thanksgiving cactus Schlumbergera truncata
 - Toothed or jagged segments
- Easter cactus Rhipsalidopsis gaertneri formerly S. gaertneri
 - Starts flowering in spring as days begin to lengthen
- Bright, indirect light
- Moist, well-drained soil
- Can be long lived
- Rebloom Christmas and Thanksgiving Cactus
- Begin forcing October 1st
 - 14 hours of total darkness each night and bright light during the day
 - Provide cooler night temperatures
 - Allow soil to go a bit drier

AFRICAN VIOLET

Streptocarpus formerly Saintpaulia

- Bright, indirect light
- Moist, organic soil
- High humidity
- Warm, draft free location
- Keep cold water off leaves
- Prevent leaves from touching salt buildup on soil surface and pot lip

MOTH ORCHID

Phalaenopsis

- Bright, indirect light
- Orchid potting mix
- Water thoroughly once a week with tepid water
- High humidity
- Orchid Care
- Reblooming Moth Orchids

BRIGHT OR DIRECT LIGHT

ZEBRA HAWORTHIA

Haworthiopsis attenuata formerly Haworthia attenuata

- Bright, indirect to direct light
- o Tolerates lower light than most cacti
- Cacti and succulent potting mix
- Warm temperatures in summer and cooler in winter

ECHEVERIA

- Some Hens & Chicks are Echeveria and others are Sempervivum (low severity toxicity)
- Bright to direct light
- Well-drained soil
- Cooler temperatures in the winter

BURRO'S TAIL

Sedum morganianum

- Bright to direct light
- Allow soil to dry between watering
- Cold temperature tolerant
- Cool and dry helps promote spring bloom

WAX PLANT

Hoya carnosa

- Bright light
- Well-drained potting mix
- Water thoroughly when potting mix is dry
- Keep soil a bit more moist in summer when actively growing
- Flowers form on long, bare stem do not remove these stems
- High humidity in spring and summer, cooler temperatures and drier soil in winter promotes flowering on pot bound plants

LIPSTICK PLANT

Aeschynanthus humilis

- Bright light for best flowering
- Loose, well-drained potting mix
- Water thoroughly when top inch of soil is dry
- Prefers warm temperatures away from drafts
- Encourage flowering

PONYTAIL PALM

Beaucarnea recurvata

- Bright light
- Well-drained potting mix
- Water thoroughly when potting mix is dry

NORFOLK ISLAND PINE

Araucaria heterophylla

- Bright light
- Excessive sunlight may cause bleaching of leaves
- Moist, well-drained soil
- High humidity
- Cool, not drafty location

HIBISCUS

Hibiscus rosa-sinensis

Overwintering indoors



A FEW PET SAFE HERBS

BASIL CILANTRO LEMON BALM ROSEMARY SAGE

A FEW HERBS TO AVOID - TOXIC TO PETS

COMMON MINT LAVENDER LEMON GRASS OREGANO PARSLEY

OTHER PET AND KID FRIENDLY GARDENING TIPS

- Display them out of reach
- Hanging basket
- o High shelf
- Prevent digging and using potting mix as litter box
- Mulch soil
 - Chunky bark
 - Corks
 - Foil
- Cat scat mats
- Grow wheat grass for cats
